## Truckee River Railroad

2022 was a very successful year for our ride-on train in the regional park, affectionately known as the Truckee River Railroad. The trains ran on 10 Saturdays this season, giving a total of 3,814 rides to children of all ages. Twenty volunteers put in a total of 420 hours to make it happen, and many of them were out there nearly every run day, setting up equipment, running the trains, greeting guests, punching tickets, blowing whistles, and keeping everyone safe. We also conducted two formal safety presentations and did "Operation Lifesaver" training on four Saturdays.

Thanks to all the volunteers and riders, and we look forward to doing it all again in 2023.

### Model Railroad

The Tahoe Donner Railroad Society is considering building a historical model railroad. The model would complement the Society's museums, rolling stock, Trestle Tours, and the Truckee River Railroad riding train as another way to acquaint locals and visitors with Truckee's rich railroading history. It would be open for public viewing on summer weekends and special events.

Our model railroad would depict Truckee in the early 1900s, a time when railroads were the mainstay of local and long-distance transportation, a major component of the local economy, and an important catalyst for the nascent tourist industry. In addition to the Southern Pacific mainline, our model railroad would include the Lake Tahoe Railway & Transportation Company's train to Tahoe City, the Hobart Southern standard gauge line to Hobart Mills, and the narrow gauge Sierra Nevada Wood & Lumber logging lines snaking through the forests north of Truckee. Truckee itself would be modeled as accurately as possible, and would include the SP Depot, Commercial Row, the granite roundhouse, and the balloon track. The railroad would probably be done in HO scale (1:87), but N scale (1:160) would be considered if space is a limiting factor.

Several alternatives have been considered for housing the model railroad. One option is a dedicated building in the Truckee River Regional Park. This would require a major fund-raising effort, but is probably the best way to ensure the long-term viability of the railroad. Another possibility would be donated space, preferably with a long-term commitment, but even short-term would be considered to get things rolling. The third option is to develop the railroad as a modular layout that could be "popped up" in various locations for operation and public viewing. Some combination of the three approaches over time is also possible.

## New Car Barn at the Regional Park

A new 42-foot-long carbarn has appeared at the Truckee River Railroad in the Truckee River Regional Park. The project, which has been in the works for over a year, was done using a modular approach with 8-foot sections. The carbarn will enable us to store a complete "consist" (riding cars and caboose) for the 2.5" scale train that is pulled by the steam engine. The new carbarn will make it easier to assemble the steam train for our public runs during the summer months, and also expands our overall equipment storage capacity.

The areas of focus for the website are the Truckee Railroad Museum and its affiliation with Museum of Truckee History, the Truckee River Railroad (our 7.5 inch gauge railroad in

the Truckee Regional Park), our display of historic railroad equipment in the Truckee Railyard, our "Trestle Tours" (guided exploration of historic railroad sites around Truckee), and our efforts to preserve the legacy of Truckee's railroads.

The website hosts a nearly complete archive of the Society's newsletter, Snowshed. These newsletters contain a wealth of historical information regarding Truckee's railroading history.

The website uses "responsive" web technologies, meaning that the format of each page adapts to device on which it is viewed. This provides an appropriate experience whether the site is viewed on a desktop or laptop computer, a tablet, or a cell phone.
