TRUCKEE DONNER RAILROAD SOCIETY OPENS INTERIM RAILROAD MUSEUM INDOWNTOWNTRUCKEE

After months of planning and hard work by an incredible number of volunteers and local businesses, the Truckee Donner Railroad Society opened its interim railroad museum in downtown Truckee on May 8, 2010 - fittingly, National Train Day.


The museum, which is a work in progress, is housed in a 1950's era Southern Pacific caboose located next to the train depot. Included in the new museum are various artifacts, pictures and displays depicting the impact of local railroading activities on Truckee and the surrounding area. The first Transcontinental Railroad as well as local narrow gauge logging and tourist lines are included. In addition to the exhibits, the museum will serve as a base of operations for various educational programs including area Trestle Tours and educational outreach activities. Future Society focus well be on the creation of a permanent, world class museum within the proposed Rail Yard development east of downtown's commercial row.

In addition to the Caboose Museum, the society has four other pieces of equipment available for viewing (see map below). The equipment includes an 80 ton GE center cab switcher, a Southern Pacific 1950 Pullman Sleeper, 1905 10 ton, self propelled Brown hoisting crane and a SP Rotary Snowplow. The fence around this equipment is there for your safety. Please do not attempt to gain access to this equipment.





Truckee Railroad Museum Exhibits


The basic layout of the exhibits is depicted below. The entrance is on the right.





Tourism Area – The tourism area has two exhibits. First seen coming around the corner will be the LTR&TCo & Passenger Car display. It depicts how railroads contributed in transforming the area from logging to tourism. Across the aisle is a restored sleeper unit from our 1950 Southern Pacific Pullman sleeper car.

Logging Area – Logging and lumber played a big part in the development of the Truckee area. In this area, visitors will see the story of one of the companies, Hobart Mills. In addition, there is a beautiful diorama built in HO scale (1:87.1). It depicts a typical logging scene.



Transcontinental Railroad – In the mid 1860's the First Transcontinental Railroad was built over the Sierra and through Truckee. The story of the difficult endeavor and some of the people that made it happen is brought to life in the museum. In addition, all the problems keeping trains running over the summit with high snow depths are shown.
