Since our opening in May, we are successfully meeting our objectives. Over 4500 visitors from all over the United States and many foreign countries have visited our museum. Twenty seven percent of the visitors are Truckee residents, an important statistic in our effort to build support for our envisioned World Class museum. While most of the visitors are in Truckee for other reasons, the Museum is causing them to stay downtown longer, a fact that the downtown merchants have noticed. We are beginning to see a few visitors who have come to town specifically to visit the Museum. Monetarily, donations are covering operating expenses and we are generating some funds to support rolling stock restoration efforts and expenses encountered in our efforts to market and raise funds for the future museum.

We have learned a bit about what works and what doesn't work, both in the displays and in operating the museum. We're tweaking a few of the displays and, thanks to the modeling skill of Ron Mason, are adding a new

As 2010 comes to a close, I would have to say that it has been an excellent year for the Tahoe Donner Railroad Society. We opened our Interim Railroad Museum on May 8th with much fanfare and have entertained over 4,500 visitors since. The completion of the museum was accomplished with the combined effort of many people and organizations but I would like to thank those 5 or 6 people who accomplished the vast majority of the physical work to transform our old caboose into an excellent little museum.

We are now starting the process of establishing a significant, permanent Railroad museum in Truckee. This is a multiyear project and we have set an objective of opening the new museum on the 150th anniversary of the first train arriving in Truckee from Sacramento on the Transcontinental Railroad. That anniversary will occur in 2018. The entire Board of Directors is involved in the strategic planning to make that objective come to fruition. As our plans become more definite, we will be asking for many volunteers to work on selected parts of the plan. I would like to announce that Ted Owens, Supervisor, Fifth District of Nevada County has recently joined our Board of Directors. Ted brings

display to tell the story of the Donner Summit Tunnels. There are still a few unfinished items from the original plan that haven't been completed, primarily because of the workload of key people. Although we originally planned to be open weekends and holidays, we've learned to modify that goal slightly. Inclement weather and holiday timing often result in no one being downtown which in turn, results in no, or very few, visitors.

I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to our staff of volunteer docents especially the few who have shouldered the bulk of the load. While often just in time, we've managed to staff every planned shift except for one. To relieve the load on these few, we need to both add some more names to the list and make it easier to find a convenient date. Toward this end, we now have a computer based calendar signup system that allows all docents to view the schedule months into the future and sign up for shift vacancies compatible with their personal schedules. This enables those who are not full time Truckee residents to find a date compatible with their schedule. If you haven't volunteered because you feel uncertain of your expertise, you needn't worry. We have a comprehensive docent manual covering the nuts and bolts needed for opening and closing the museum and exhibit background information to answer most of the questions asked by visitors. Either Phil Langley or myself will walk you through the process and perhaps share a shift or two to get you started. We have also begun a program of expert lectures especially for docents to provide in depth background information on topics related to the museum. All that is really required is the willingness to open a friendly conversation with the visitor and make him feel welcome.

They did a tremendous amount of hard work in less than ideal conditions. Their work will go a long way to protecting the car from further deterioration until we are able to do a proper restoration.

The webmaster should have some basic computer skills to build and maintain web pages. We are currently using Dreamweaver CS3 for updating our website, but any good web development tool should work. Skills that would be helpful are: understanding of HTML, some understanding of CSS formatting, and the ability to use web page table layouts. While Javascript is not required, it would help if you are at least able to recognize it and understand how it fits in pages. And, of course, you need to have your own computer, access to the internet and a web development program.
